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

In recognition of that milestone WOI brought together our 1st individual and our 1000th individual that have been placed through our services and are employed in the community.

Manufacturing and Quality News

The Watauga Opportunities Production Department has had an exciting opportunity recently. On March 13th and 14th, we partnered with Waste Reduction Partners to facilitate a hands-on Lean Manufacturing training event that included value stream mapping, line diagraming, and environmental impact review. Waste Reduction Partners is a state-sponsored technical assistance group of staff including retired industrial professionals, engineers and scientists. Their team has helped over 2,030 NC business and institutions save more that \$71 million in utility costs and operational savings since the year 2000. We chose our Sarstedt Corporation production jobs to focus on during the workshop because of the volume of cell scrapers that we produce. Three individuals from the Waste



Reduction Partners' technical assistance group worked with a cross -function 10 member WOI staff team to review and implement process line improvements to WOI's laboratory appliance assembly area. The team generated fourteen opportunities for improvement, including the redesign of assembly layout, inspection, and packaging. The project team estimated a 25 percent improvement in part flow and time savings as well as other ergonomic, motion, space, and environmental improvements. What resulted was a more efficient, flowing work area. We are looking forward to utilizing the techniques learned to maintain a streamlined and effective production process.

In May, Watauga Opportunities welcomed the completion of a new roof on the building. This was a much needed improvement that will benefit Watauga Opportunities for years to come.
